## Accommodation

We are delighted to help newcomers to the Trust whilst they find their feet in Bristol, however doctors must be made aware that this would be a short-term arrangement only and on a first-come-first served basis, as we now have very limited single accommodation.

This is generally offered to doctors on short courses or visitors to the Trust, who are unable to commit to a standard six month tenancy agreement privately elsewhere. Our accommodation is mainly located on Alfred Hill, less than five minutes from the main Bristol Royal Infirmary buildings.

The charge for the rooms, inclusive of all bills, is £22.61 per night for the first 10 consecutive nights stayed, with any further nights of the same visit being charged at £16.37 per night. The rental charges quoted will be subject to a small increase on 1 August 2018.

Anyone who has a six months contract or more with the Trust will be advised to seek accommodation in the private sector as they are able to commit to a Tenancy Agreement for a minimum of six months.

If you wish to rent one of our rooms, you should email the residences office [residencesenquiries@uhbristol.nhs.uk](mailto:residencesenquiries@uhbristol.nhs.uk). The team will provide you with a request form which must be fully completed by yourself and returned to them – they will then advise you of availability accordingly.

\*Please note that we do not run a waiting list for single accommodation.
